New Beekeeper Hives at PDBKA Apiary

- 1. Email Anne Ballard with request to use PDBKA apiary for hive site.
- 2. Construct a brand new hive (help can be given if required).
- 3. Bring brand new hive to PDBKA apiary any time from now on.
- 4. Site according to directions from Graham Rowden or one of the custodians
- 1. When the colonies on the apiary produce queen cells, these will be used to produce new colonies (nucs.).
- 2. These will be placed in new beekeepers' hives.
- 3. They need to be looked after in order to build up during the season.
- 4. This will be done by the new beekeeper with help from the Association.
- 5. They will be taken to their final site at end of the season.
- 6. They will need to be fed and looked after over winter ready for 2020.
- 1. A swarm is biological division of a colony in response to various stimuli, often over- crowding in the hive. A very large number of bees including the old queen, issue from the hive and settle on a nearby tree prior to deciding on their final home.
- 2. Unless a swarm originates from a hive on our apiary, it cannot be used in a new hive.

All hives left on the PDBKA site are at the owners' risk.

New beekeepers planning to have a hive on the Association Apiary need to register as full PDBKA members.
